illicit drugs Displacement from traditional drugs tends to be temporary and is dependent on the cost and availability of traditional drugs Social and medical harms: Use of illicitly-supplied medicines increases risk of accidental overdose, infections and blood-borne viruses (BBVs) Medicines supplied illicitly may be counterfeit or adulterated

The NEADL identifies drugs that belong to one or more of three categories: essential; necessary; and critical Drugs described as essential are those listed in the World Health Organization's 18th Edition of its list of essential medicines, ie drugs considered to be minimum medicine needs for a basic healthcare system [15] Necessary
